Call for Papers: EHS/SHA/WHA meeting in Kansas City, Mo., October 24-27, 2024

#### PREFERRED TOPICS


The EHS welcomes papers, panels and roundtables that consider European history from all thematic fields, methodological perspectives, and time periods. This includes not just research focused exclusively on Europe and its overseas empires, but also research which examines European history from a colonial, comparative or global perspective. Additionally, we welcome scholarly presentations which thematize or challenge the definition and conceptualization of 'Europe' over time. Finally, we welcome submissions on pedagogy and the teaching of European history. This includes not just classroom pedagogy, but also extends to museum and digital pedagogy, archival practices, exhibition curation, and other forms of Public History. Finally, as the 2024 conference is being held concurrently—though separately—with the Western Historical Association, we also welcome papers which examine the history and experience of Europeans in the American West and Midwest regions; consider the role of the American West in the European imaginary; the role of Europeans in the Western frontier; and other connections between Europe and the American West.

#### SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

**Individual** paper proposal submissions are accepted and will be matched into panels by the Program Committee. Paper proposals require a title, 250 word abstract, and brief presenter CV.

Complete Panel proposals should be composed of three 15-minute formal papers, a chair, and a commentator. Panel proposals require a Panel Title, Panel Abstract as well as Presenter information from each panelist. Panels may not be comprised solely of graduate students and must represent more than one institution.

**Roundtables** should be cohesive, organized discussions with three to four discussants who respond to questions from a designated moderator. Discussants focus on a specific field or topic in informal 8-minute remarks, but do not read a formal paper. The moderator asks questions to which they respond, leaving ample time for general Q&A.





### Call for nominations for the Nancy Rupprecht Memorial Graduate Student Prize in Women's History

### AWARDED FOR BEST GRADUATE PAPER IN EUROPEAN WOMEN'S HISTORY BY THE EUROPEAN HISTORY SECTION OF THE SOUTHERN HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION

The European History Section is pleased to announce the inaugural annual Nancy Rupprecht Memorial Graduate Student Prize for best paper on European Women's history, generously endowed by the late Nancy Rupprecht. Dr. Rupprecht (BA and MA, University of Missouri-Columbia, PhD, University of Michigan) was a professor of History, Chair of the Holocaust Studies Program, and a founder of the Women's and Gender Studies Program at Middle Tennessee State University. She wrote and published extensively on the Holocaust, World War II, and the Hitler Youth. She was a recipient of MTSU's King-Hampton Award for outstanding service to women and the Ayne Cantrell Award for service to the Women's Studies Program. Dr. Rupprecht was a life member of the European History Section, and served twice as its Chair, among other leadership roles.

This award recognizes Dr. Rupprecht's commitment to supporting and promoting European Women's History, graduate studies, and the European History Section. The Nancy Rupprecht Memorial Graduate Student Prize will be awarded annually by the EHS for the best graduate student paper in the field of European Women's History. Submissions may be PhD or Master's thesis chapters (no complete theses/dissertations), seminar papers, or other original research papers of any nature in European Women's History (not Gender Studies). Only submissions written during the academic year preceding the granting of the prize, including summer 2023, are acceptable.

The prize winner will be honored at the annual meeting of the EHS in Charlotte, NC on November 11. The prize carries a stipend of \$1,000.

#### Call for nominations for the Snell Prize

### AWARDED FOR BEST GRADUATE SEMINAR PAPER IN EUROPEAN HISTORY BY THE EUROPEAN HISTORY SECTION OF THE SOUTHERN HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION

The John L. Snell Memorial Prize is named for Professor John L. Snell (1923-1972) who was a distinguished scholar and diplomatic historian and a founder of the European History Section. A bomber pilot during World War II, he taught at Tulane University, the University of Pennsylvania, and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where he received his Ph.D. in 1950. The Snell Prize is given annually to the graduate student with the best seminar research paper in European history, written within the past year. Papers on any aspect and any period of European history or European history in a global context are welcome.

The Prize winner will be honored at the annual meeting of the EHS in Charlotte, NC in November 2023. The award carries a stipend of \$100. The Snell Award winner also receives one complimentary year of student membership in the European History Section of the Southern Historical Association. Occasionally, the Committee will also give an Honorable Mention to a second or third outstanding submission.

The competition is open to graduate students of any member of the EHS or of a program at a Southern college or university. Students may submit only one paper. Only papers written during

the academic year immediately preceding the granting of the award, including summer 2023, are acceptable. The content of the paper must focus on European history ("European" is defined as encompassing the entire continent, including Russia, from pre-history to the present). A letter of endorsement from the supervising faculty member or advisor must accompany the submission. The letter should confirm that the paper was written during the academic year immediately preceding the granting of the award, including summer 2023.

The competition is open *only* to seminar papers, the length of which shall not exceed 50 pages, including footnotes or endnotes (bibliography does not count toward this limit). Seminar papers may be related to prospective theses or dissertations, but they may *not* be edited-down versions of theses or dissertations.

Manuscripts must be typed in Times New Roman 12-point font, doublespaced with 1-inch margins on all sides, and include a bibliography and the customary documentation. One copy should be sent to *each* of the following three judges (via email) by September 1, 2023:

### Call for nominations for the Simpson Award

#### AWARDED FOR THE BEST PAPER PRESENTED AT AN EHS PANEL

The European History Section of the Southern Historical Association is pleased to announce the biennial competition for the Simpson Award for the best paper presented at an EHS panel in the previous two years (2021 or 2022). The award is named for Amos Simpson (1925-2014), who earned his Ph.D. in Modern German History from the University of California at Berkeley. The author of several books and articles, he was the Frank E. Godchaux Honor Professor of History at University of Louisiana at Lafayette, as well as co-founder of the Center for Louisiana Studies. He also served as president of the Louisiana Historical Association, the Southwestern Historical Association, and the European History Section of the Southern Historical Association.

Papers given at the two meetings previous to the year of the granting for the award are eligible for consideration. Europe is defined as encompassing the entire continent, including Russia, from pre-history to the present. The award is given in odd years and carries a cash value of \$100. The prize winner will be honored at the annual lunch meeting of the EHS in conjunction with the Southern Historical Association in Charlotte, NC, November, 11, 2023.

Eligible papers are to be submitted to the members of the Parker-Schmidt-Simpson Committee by past panel chairs or panelists. Criteria for selection of the winning essay include quality and originality of research, new and stimulating interpretations and insights, and literary quality.

One copy must be sent to each of the three committees members by September 1, 2023.

#### Call for nominations for the Baker-Burton Award

#### AWARDED FOR THE BEST FIRST BOOK IN EUROPEAN HISTORY

The European History Section of the Southern Historical Association is pleased to announce the biennial competition for the Baker-Burton Award. The award was created in 2005 and is named for two distinguished scholars, Professor Vaughan Baker Simpson of the University of Louisiana Lafayette, and University of Akron Professor Emerita June K. Burton. The award is given by the European History Section for the best first book in European history by a member of the EHS or a graduate student or a faculty member of a Southern college or university. "European" is defined as encompassing the entire continent, including Russia, from pre-history to the present.

The award is given in odd years and carries a cash value of \$100. Books published between August 1st, the year it was previously awarded and July 31st the year the award is given are eligible for consideration. Criteria for selection include quality and originality of research, new and stimulating interpretations and insights, and literary quality.

Eligible books may be recommended to the chair of the Baker-Burton-Smith Committee by their authors or publishers or by any member of the EHS. The person making the recommendation is responsible for ensuring that each committee member receives a copy by July 31, 2023.

#### TRAVEL, BOOKS AND ARTICLES, NEW POSTS, RETIREMENTS, AWARDS


Wendy Koenig, Long Beach City College. It is with profound sadness that we announce the passing of long-time EHS member Wendy Koenig after an eight-month battle with colon cancer. Wendy was active in the EHS, serving as Vice Chair from 2011-2012. and Chair, 2012-2013. She also served on the Parker-Schmitt-Simpson Award committee from 2020 to 2022. Previously she served on the Baker-**Burton-Smith Award** Committee from 2007-2009 and again from 2014-2016. Wendy received a PhD in the History of Art from the Ohio State University and received tenure three times, at Middle Tennessee State University, North Central College, and Long Beach City College. At MTSU, Wendy worked closely with the late Nancy Rupprecht on the college's Holocaust Studies Conference. This work resulted in Wendy and Nancy co-editing three collections of papers from the conferences, all published by Cambridge Scholar's Press: Holocaust Persecution: Responses and Consequences (2010); The Holocaust and World War II: In History and in Memory (2012): and Global Perspectives on the Holocaust: History, Identity, Legacy (2015). Wendy will be greatly missed.

Karl Trybus, Limestone College, published *iVino!* The History and Identity of Spanish Wine (University of Nebraska Press, forthcoming, October, 2023).




Wendy Koenig (1966-2022)


### The Mathews-Weinberg Luncheon Talk:
